


Did you find any of these to be useful for what you made for your Unit 2 'Experiments in Co-creation' project?




4. If yes or maybe: which specific research trip(s) were useful for your practice and why?

- 'the Warburg Collection was interesting. it helped me further understand differences and similarities in time, culture, and art.'
- 'I found the archive really useful. It was an area of research that I had never considered and the imagery was very unique'
- 'The national gallery got us to explore and analyse specific movements and identifiable tropes progressing through several ages and eras of art. Therefore I used this in my concept building and in realising how different eras and cultures view and use source material and artistic techniques in modern and apt ways. I was inspired to delve into contemporary issues of our society and adapt them in a 1950s style for example.'
- 'The first and second helped me identify features I liked in work and make connections with newer artists'
- 'Admittedly, the trips did not directly correlate to our project as we explored very different themes, settings and content than what we encountered o our trips. However, the things we learnt on the way allowed me to employ my learnt knowledge to different subjects. 
5. If no: why not?
